

## **Principal's Report**

We've entered a new season as we conclude Term 2 and I'm not talking about the weather.

Subject selections are afoot for much of the college, and this is a season where we can look towards the future and plan for success. It has been excellent to visit some of our classes, talk to students and hear from staff around some of the commentary that has surrounded this time. Discussions of hope and aspiration beyond school, thoughts of paths to achieve goals, ruminations on what students are good at and what that may translate to in their choices. There is strong correlative evidence between having a goal and achievement. It is, of course, hard to achieve a goal when you haven't defined what your goals are. I encourage all families from Year 8 to 11 to have good discussions about subject selections and, within that, talk about what students are good at, what their dreams are and how to set shared goals for their success. Subject selections are an important part of our journey at Melba College - our Pathways focus is based on the idea that when students have an element of choice and agency in their learning journey, they are more likely to be aligned with their studies, more engaged with the work and, ultimately, more successful. My hope is that throughout this subject selection season that students and families have robust discussions, focussed on growth and aspiration, that allow students to walk into the second half of the year with renewed vigour and determination to work towards making those goals manifest.

Though my opening referenced a new season and I didn't mention weather initially, there are a few things I would like to note in relation to winter and the upcoming months.

- Getting to school safe and commuting in the cold. Having made the decision to commute to work via bike to get some extra training in, I can attest that it is getting cold out there. There's frost on the grass and a chill in the air. With public transport disruptions and the cold, I encourage students that are commuting by bus, bike or legs to make sure you dress warmly for the weather and be cautious around the roads. A moment extra to double check a crossing or double check the PTV schedule can be a wise investment in making sure you get to school safe and sound. Getting to school safely is the first step to a good education!
- **Uniform.** Wearing extra layers is important to stay warm in winter and avoid the chill, but I Term 4 - 6/10-19/12 would like to reinforce that a hoodie is not an extra layer on the menu for school. Having a hoodie confiscated is an inconvenience for both students and teachers, so I encourage students to ensure you avoid the temptation of hoodies and out of uniform items. Wear the College uniform proudly: You'll be doing yourself a service, as much as the school!
- Being safe online. With the cold upon us, there will likely be more occasions that students are online or accessing devices. You may have read about the recent changes to school jurisdiction regarding online presence and the ability to impose consequences for online misconduct. I encourage all students to think about your online presence and make the choice to be safe online this winter (and beyond). In my many years working with students, I cannot recall a single instance where students have felt regret for being kind to someone, particularly online - but I have, on many occasions, encountered students that have deeply regretted saying or doing things online that they never would have in person. Trolling, baiting and bullying online does not serve any purpose that will grow you as a person and I encourage students to conduct themselves online as responsible young adults and STRIVE to reflect an honourable character online, as we see in our classes at school.

As Term 2 reports are released in the coming weeks, I would also like to encourage families to review these with students. Consider the growth shown by students and celebrate their successes with them. Acknowledging student growth and work is a powerful way to encourage future success. Similarly, where there are areas for improvement – look at these with a growth mindset. There is always room for new growth and setting higher goals for the future. As you look towards Semester 2, I encourage all students to make a commitment to being their best selves and renew your dedication to achieving your goals. As a student, you spend about 600 hours at school each term - make the most of it and give your best - we want you to succeed and, given you're here, - why not give it your best? Know that the work being done at school is there to prepare for the hopes of the future.

For our Year 12 cohort - We are here with you, and I want you to know that you have the power within you to complete this last leg strong. Ask any endurance athlete about their experience in their races and they will tell you stories about the wall. That moment in the race where you are battling with your mind and it feels like you can't give anymore... that you're tempted to slow down or even stop... where you consider giving up on that goal or place you were aiming for. Year 12 can be like this. You've put in the hard yards






### Science - Greg Mellow - Domain Leader

The Year 7 science class has been a really fun and friendly group to work with. They bring great energy to lessons, especially during hands-on activities like making slime, which they absolutely love! It's great to see them asking interesting questions and linking what we're learning to things they've seen or experienced in real life.

**8 Science**: Students have focused on understanding energy this term and have achieved some impressive test results. During our Energy Topic students have had the opportunity to investigate a range of different types of energy. Through our practical activities we had explored how light bends and splits to produce colour and made the classic cup telephone to investigate how sound can be transmitted through different mediums.





#### **Year 9 Forensics**

Students investigated the relationship between the nature of different kinds of cut and blunt wounds to patterns and sizes of blood spatters by simulating splats of fake blood with hammers and pipettes.

### 10 Psychology

10 Psychology students investigated the probability of typical casino games and played simulated card games wagering with M&Ms as stakes.

The class M&Ms were measured after every game session and we discovered players lost 11% on average every eight minutes. The emotional highs and lows and changes in 'strategy' were discussed and students discovered how easy it was to lose everything in a short amount of time.





### Year 10 Chemistry

During our Energy Topic students have had the opportunity to investigate a range of different types of energy. Through our practical activities we had explored how light bends and splits to produce colour and made the classic cup telephone to investigate how sound can be transmitted through different mediums.

#### Year 12 Road to Zero Excursion

As part of the course, students will engage with 13 interactive digital experiences that explore key elements of the Safe System approach to road safety.

This immersive excursion supports learning across multiple curriculum areas, including the Year 12 Literacy curriculum through the "Road to Zero Physics Challenge – Science in Motion"

**Year 11 Chemistry** students researched topics on a range of topics, including the sustainability of a commercial product and producing 'greener' polymers / plastics. They will each be giving a 5 minutes oral presentation on their findings and I am really looking forward to learning what they have discovered.

A highlight for Year 12 Physics was exploring magnetic and electric fields, experimenting with a Van De Graaff Generator and using iron fillings to visualise field lines between magnets.

### Mathematics - Michael Palmer - Domain Leader

It's been a busy and rewarding semester in Mathematics.

Across Years 7 to 10, students have been building their skills in number, algebra, measurement, space, probability and statistics. We've placed a strong focus on solving real-world problems, and students have tackled rich tasks that ask them to apply their knowledge in meaningful contexts. This has included using spreadsheets to collect, organise and analyse data — an important skill for both maths and everyday life.

Daily review has become a regular part of our lessons. These short, focused sessions help students revisit key skills, identify gaps, and strengthen their understanding over time. It's been great to see students gaining confidence and making connections between different areas of maths.

Our VCE students have been working hard this term and are currently undertaking their school-based mid-semester exams. Well done to all of them for their efforts so far this year.

Finally, this semester marks our transition to the Victorian Curriculum 2.0. Semester reports will reflect this change, and we look forward to continuing to align our teaching and assessment with the updated curriculum.

Some students were familiar with the CapCut program.



#### Product Design & Technology - Wood


Semester 1 marks the end of our first batch of elective classes and also the core rotation for the Year 8s.

With the PD&T Wood department transitioning to offer VCE VET Furnishing at Melba next year, the Year 10 course has been rejigged to align with its needs, with a greater focus on skill building, tools, and practical processes. The new main project, The Outdoor Chair, I am happy (relieved) to say, has been a winner! Completing the construction of the chairs came down to the wire in last Friday's class, with smiles, shouts, and sighs of relief as each student tightened the final bolts and tested out their new thrones.

A couple of weeks before the end of term, we sadly had to say bon voyage to our international exchange student, Nathanael Dufour. He made quite an impression on us all and became a pivotal member of the class. Personally, I am very happy to say that his woodworking skills are greatly improved since he first arrived in the class six months ago.



The Year 9 class has made great strides with their skills and confidence in the workshop. They have made design choices and considered how they want their CAT 2 Footstools to look and are on the home stretch of construction. Often in class, peers will be huddled around a workbench in intense discussion about the best way to proceed with a next step. It is heartening to see how supportive they are and how invested they are in getting their builds perfect.

The Year 8s have been very busy with two new projects added to their curriculum. We still have our introductory 3D Sign and Handled Box for CAT 1 & 2. Additionally, two new projects have been introduced, focusing on honing students' numeracy and technical marking-out skills: a dowel jointed Bookend in Pine and Blackwood, and a Tic-Tac-Toe game, which offers numerous opportunities for problem-solving.







Lastly, I am very happy to say we have finally finished a very big project for our school community. With many willing hands, the Canteen Tables and seating are now done. To give you an idea of the longevity of this task, the tops were first put together in our old workshop by my Year 11 PD&T Wood students in 2019! Resilience is in our school motto.


Year 9s have learnt about time in Japanese and being able to talk about their daily routine.


Our Year 10s created Haiku poems on the seasons and had an interview with their sensei about their daily lives.

In Week 4, the Year 9 Outdoor Education class went on a four-day camp in the Grampians National Park.


